Personally, I am most pleased because of the continued increase in student participation. Through your efforts, and your participation, King City Secondary School will continue to grow and mature.





The strike was a result of a stalemate between teachers and board members on these main issues: a grievance procedure, tenure for competent teachers, stabilization of student teacher ratio at 1972-1973 levels, and a realistic salary grid. While teachers conferred daily at the Newmarket Legion to gain moral support and to plan action, most students took a hotiday or went on numerous field trips. ISACI was formed by Kathy Hughson, Nick Papendreou and others. Through chain phoning, 300 kids came to the school and signed petitions supporting their teachers. A meeting was then scheduled with teachers and board members present. Two streakers turned up at an excellent moment-breaking off a long-winded Board member! Finally both sides accepted arbitration with these results: salary increase from 15%-24%, stabilized PTR (17.5-1), a grievance procedure and prohibition of strikes.
