


Ski Team


Mr. Ellison

It is both an honour and a privilege to be asked to speak to you here tonight. I can't help but feel the intense exhilaration that permeates the auditorium. It is not easy to describe the feelings and emotions one experiences during a ceremony such as this, and perhaps it is not my position to do so; but I feel that the thoughts which run through our minds are just as important as the gestures performed here on stage.

As a member of the graduating class, I can safely say that along with all our hopes and fears, we feel a sense of accomplishment and at the same time a steadfast determination as we look on the years ahead.

It is easy to detect the pride felt by the friends and relatives accompanying the graduates tonight. As I look around and see some of the younger members in attendance, I can only hope that they too are instilled with the inspiration that I felt while attending previous graduation exercises.

The teachers and staff present tonight must feel a certain sense of accomplishment because this represents the culmination of years of effort and patience on their part. Without their guidance none of this would be possible.
