Valedictory Address

Life would be an easily climbed fence.

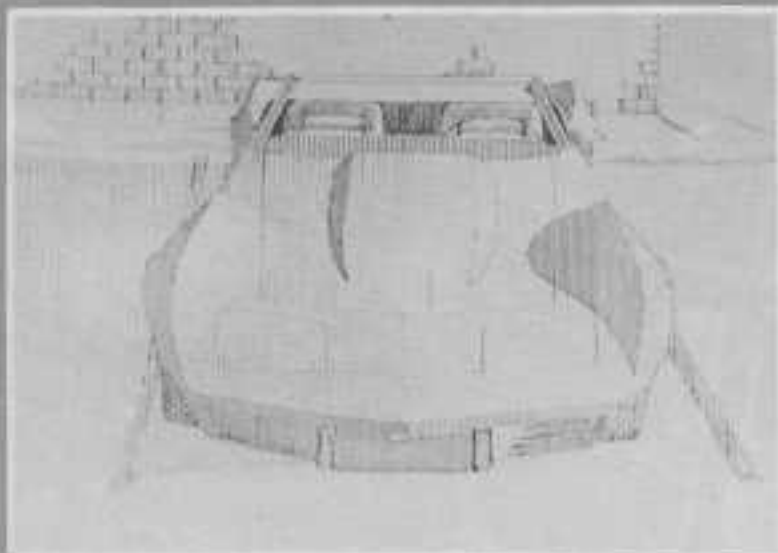
