ELECTION DAY



Some things never change . . . The floor under our feet, for example, was so sticky that my son's and my feet fought the way to our seats. We were just in time. The lights dimmed as quadraphonic sound filled the cinema, and the credits lit the screen. Hailed as the "Spielberg" of the Millsnia, Salvatore Corrado's latest work was said to harken back to his days as a student in the small-town KCSS. Since I had been one of the Class of '90 with him, I couldn't wait to watch and reminisce, and hear my son's comments about high school in the previous century. I also wondered, having sat through Mr. Henderson's Law and Classical Civ. classes and Mr. Wilson's Killer Writer's Cramp course, who had been found to play their roles. Who could be found to say "press on," in just the right tone?

The movie opened with the camera panning down a long, quiet, blue-locker-lined hallway, past walls covered with grafitti, evidence of the library construction. Suddenly, doors tipped open and the corridor was flooded with voices and faces that seemed to pour out from my memory. Following a faded army green knap-sack through the crowd, it emerged at the "cal" and headed towards those "Grade 14's": Bryan, Dave, Graeme, Brian, Frank, and Jason. Shaking my head, I smiled at the lookalike group, wondering if any of them were still studying at KCSS,

20 years after most others of us had graduated.

A voice carried from a table just out of sight, the topic under discussion evidently the changes which would result from the upbeaval in the U.S.S.R. and Eastern Europe. Actively debating the issue, were Holly Lulfman and Graham Rennie, both currently participating in Canada's

political arena.

My reflections on my classmate's various paths to their current endeavours, was interupted by an exclamation from my son, asking why so many students had their food in non-reusable containers: plastic and paper bags, metal cans, all of which were pitched into garbage pails when the bell signaled the Who could forget him? Not the tow truck company, who derived most of their business from him. Mr. Leonard's face wasn't yet up, not for a long while. I wondered where they both were now, having each left a mark on the school.

A knot of students near the famous "endangered species" mural were discussing plans for their skit in the Christmas assembly. (I recalled Jennifer Ellard's most recent interview about her research in Africa.) As students' chuckling is heard, the camera swings around to the profile, a red nose protabing, and we hear Miss Wells say, "Tami, will you ever stop clowning around?!" And, as a matter of fact, she hasn't, not

even at this year's ACTRA awards.

Inside a classroom, the students are restless to head home. It must be last period, and Calculus, to judge by Mr. Johnston's strange figures on the blackboard and the lost expressions on most of the students' faces. Cam Macleod, however doesn't seem to be having any difficulty. My





















son asked me in a whisper why "that girl" (obviously Sue Rowan) had called Cam a "browner," to which I said I would explain later. What a relief to know that I was past the Calculus final!

The clock read 3:17 as the sounds of binders closing and students chatting filled the room. others, it seemed not.









The Environmental Action Group has not received any support from King Township concerning the recycling program. The large cans

It is a parent's worst nightmare to be awakened by a telephone call from the police or hospital, that tells them their child has been killed in a drinking and driving accident. Although a large percent of these accidents involved teenagers and under-aged drinking, the rest of the population is also involved. Due to this major concern of our society, organizations across North America have been gaining support in their fight against these senseless and useless killings. Such an organization is OSAID (Ontario Students Against Impaired Driving).

Alyson Beben founded this group which consists of about 20'25 KCSS students. It was started in September of 1989 after three of her friends were killed in separate impaired driving accidents.

OSAID's goal is to strive for the elimination of alcohol and other drug related injuries and death, with the focus on impaired driving.

OSAID has started to make the students aware of this problem with an assembly which featured Mrs. Michez, the mother of a former King student who was killed in a car accident by a drunk driver. At this assembly, a play was performed by KCSS students that focus-

ed on the importance of stopping friends from driving drunk. Pamphlets and posters were given out to provide information for the students, and "Designated Driver" pins were sold.

OSAID sponsored and performed presentations at grade 9 health day, open house, and grade 8 orientation night. "Lifesaver Agreements" were given out to parents and students at these events to promote open discussion about the realities of teenage alcoholism. OSAID hopes that parents and friends of King's students will sign and live by their agreements. King City's senior prom was hosted and sponsored by OSAID in June, 1990.

OSAID is sponsoring a "Computer Fun" program to raise money for their group and give students the opportunity to meet other students from around the region, who are also involved in OSAID groups. The group also had plans to sell T-shirts and sponsor a car-wash this spring.

Alyson and Nicole Beben attended a national conference of OSAID and its affiliated organizations from across Canada in Regina, Saskatchewan from March 29 to April 2.

OSAID's goal is to provide a safe ride home and to save the lives of both impaired and innocent victims on the road.

ture ourselves for the rest of our pitiful lives.



This year was a building year with many new midgets. The 1990-91 season promises to have a greater success rate and more dedication to the sport.






Most students, however, fall into a category somewhere between these two. So pay attention to those lockers beside you. They can tell you a lot about the personality of its inhabitant.
