ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP

Though many schools have implemented recycling programs, we at King City are the only school in York Region with a full-scale Environmental Action GROUP.

Essentially, our students' interest in the environment was sparked by the Endangered Species Mural; painted by Jennifer Ellard Deveney and Elena Panziera. Thanks to Mr. Wilson who wrote Steve's speech.

Closer to home, members of the group fought to save trees in the courtyard which were going to be killed with the construction of the new library. The trees were moved to another area of the school grounds. Also, they helped to plant trees at the Kortright Conservation Centre in November.

The Environmental Action Group has not received any support from King Township concerning the recycling program. The large cans

It is a parent's worst nightmare to be awakened by a telephone call from the police or hospital, that tells them their child has been killed in a drinking and driving accident. Although a large percent of these accidents involved teenagers and under-aged drinking, the rest of the population is also involved. Due to this major concern of our society, organizations across North America have been gaining support in their fight against these senseless and useless killings. Such an organization is OSAID (Ontario Students Against Impaired Driving).

Alyson Beben founded this group which consists of about 20-25 KCSS students. It was started in September of 1989 after three of her friends were killed in separate impaired driving accidents.

OSAID's goal is to strive for the elimination of alcohol and other drug related injuries and death, with the focus on impaired driving.

OSAID has started to make the students aware of this problem with an assembly which featured Mrs. Michez, the mother of a former King student who was killed in a car accident by a drunk driver. At this assembly, a play was performed by KCSS students that focus-

ed on the importance of stopping friends from driving drunk. Pamphlets and posters were given out to provide information for the students, and "Designated Driver" pins were sold.

OSAID sponsored and performed presentations at grade 9 health day, open house, and grade 8 orientation night. "Lifesaver Agreements" were given out to parents and students at these events to promote open discussion about the realities of teenage alcoholism. OSAID hopes that parents and friends of King's students will sign and live by their agreements. King City's senior prom was hosted and sponsored by OSAID in June, 1990.

OSAID is sponsoring a "Computer Fun" program to raise money for their group and give students the opportunity to meet other students from around the region, who are also involved in OSAID groups. The group also had plans to sell T-shirts and sponsor a car-wash this spring.

Alyson and Nicole Beben attended a national conference of OSAID and its affiliated organizations from across Canada in Regina, Saskatchewan from March 29 to April 2.

OSAID's goal is to provide a safe ride home and to save the lives of both impaired and innocent victims on the road.

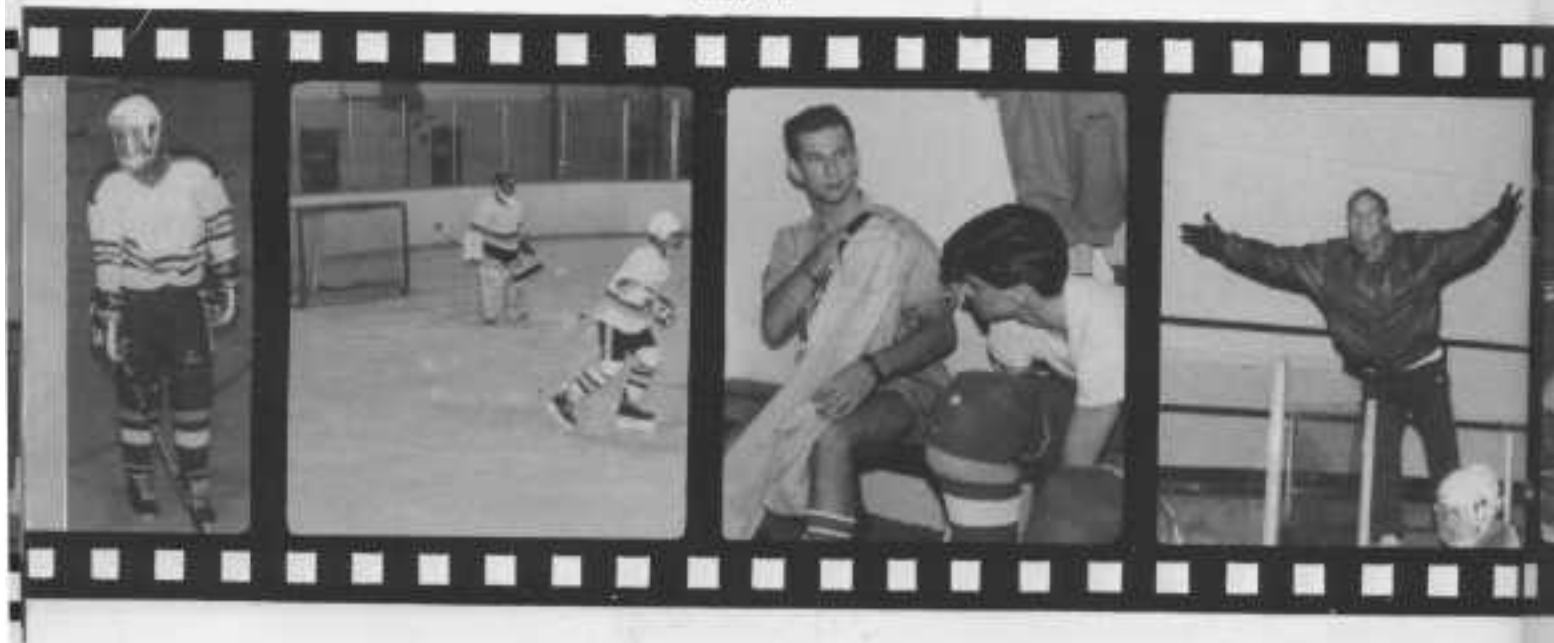
SR. HOCKEY

Most students, however, fall into a category somewhere between these two. So pay attention to those lockers beside you. They can tell you a lot about the personality of its inhabitant.



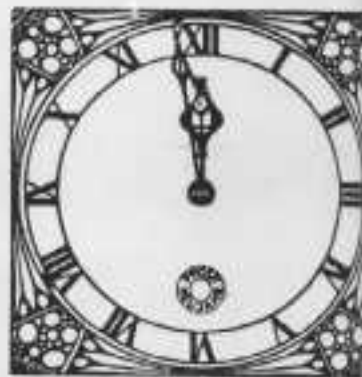

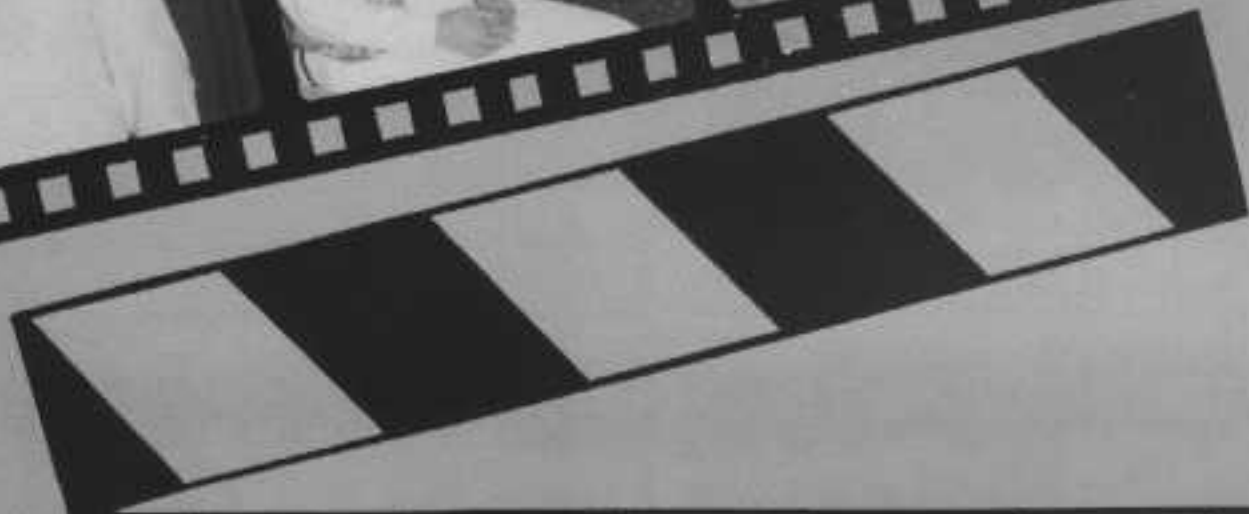


LES ARTISTES

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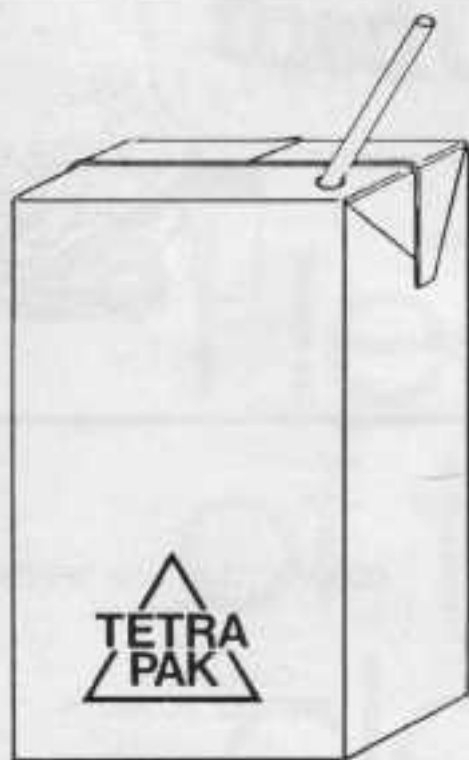


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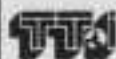
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
