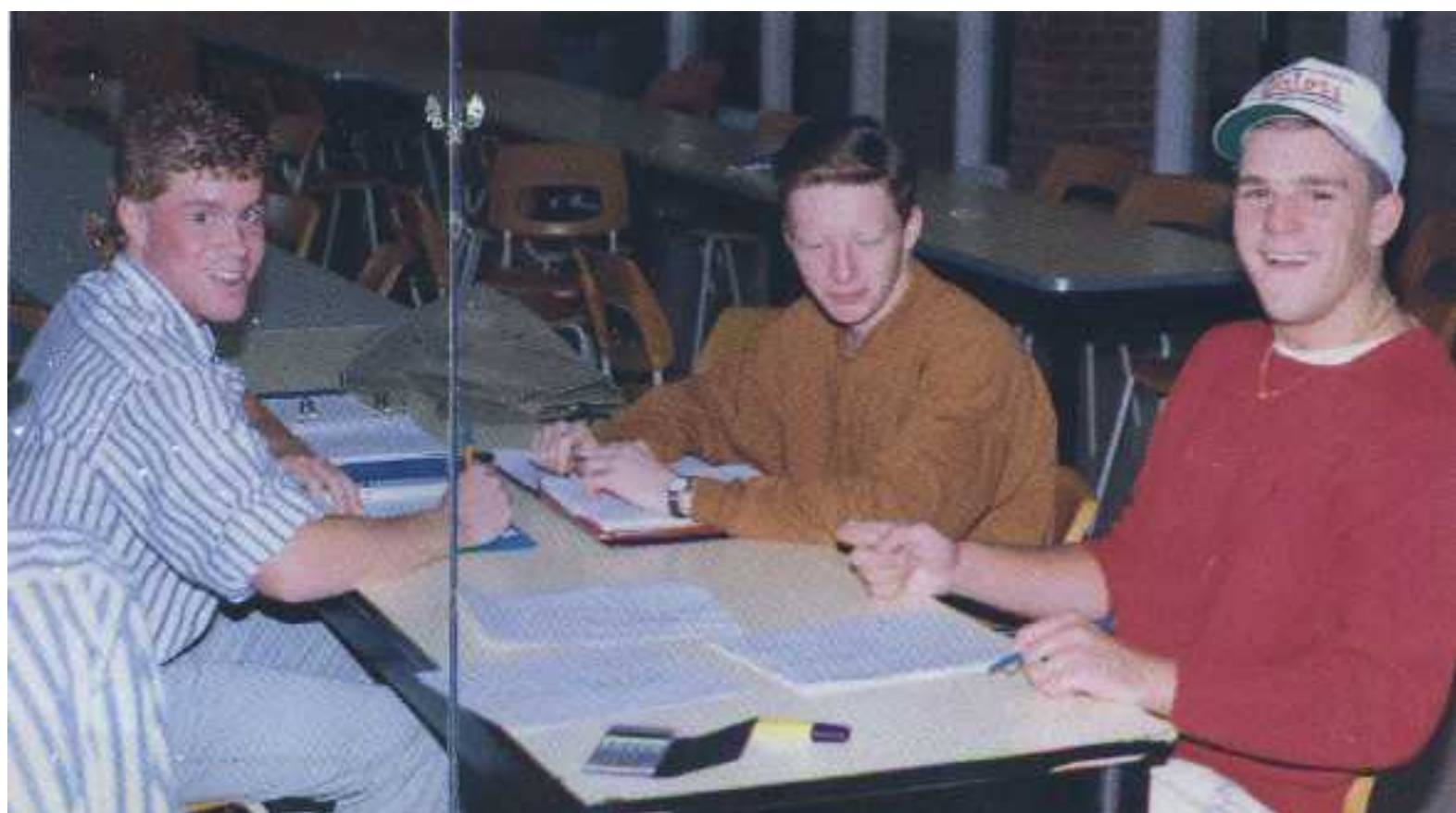
the fun-filled hours of sparcedom! (picture 7) The hours of waiting for something exciting to happen, or at least until your next class.

# Junior Awards

Junior Awards is a time to honour the academic achievements of the students of KSS. # GRADE NINE

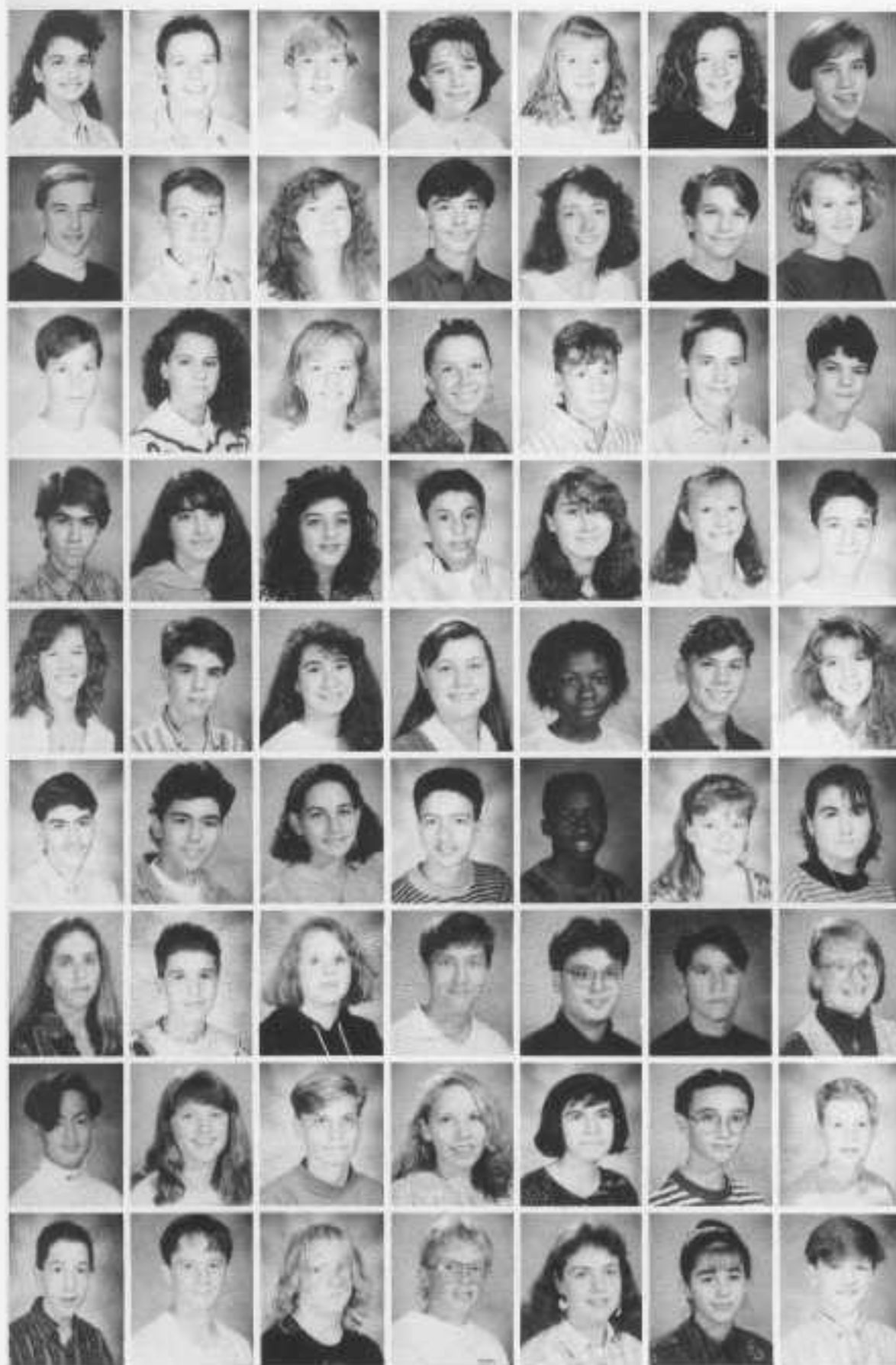

# BOYS SOCCER

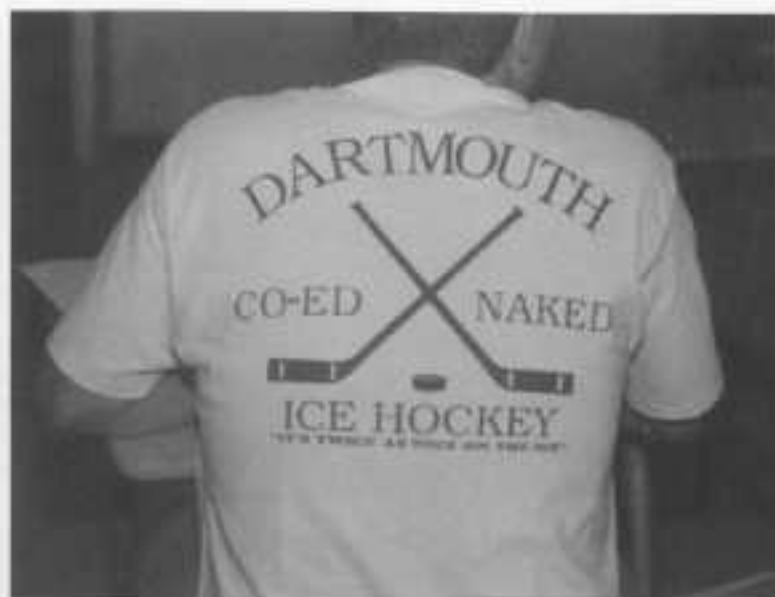

### POLICY STATEMENT ON GULF WAR: Violent aggression is not a solution to conflict...

On a planet with the military potential to destroy itself, diplomacy is the only method of resolution which can produce lasting and effective results. This includes the use of economic sanctions. Previous to January 15th only a token attempt was made to deploy these methods. Furthermore, when a conflict escalates to a global scale no one nation has the right to refuse compromise and dictate terms of negotiation. It is the responsibility of the United Nations without single-handed interference by the USA, to begin and carry out necessary diplomatic measures...Neither the UN nor any other group however, has the right to call for a physical assault on a country or region.

In a situation such as the one unfolding now in the Middle East it is essential that there be humanitarian aid to help with casualties of all sorts. Food, water and medicine are required in war zones to prevent disease and senseless human suffering. Aid is also needed to repair and prevent damage to the fragile ecosystem of which we and all living things are a part...

Canada, in this generation, has traditionally played a role as a neutral peacekeeping nation. Our recent actions in the Middle East completely reverse these policies. The use of violent aggression runs contrary to the very foundations of Canada's existence. Our resources, in dollars and manpower, would be better served providing environmental and humanitarian aid in the Middle East, rather than forming a symbolic aggressive force. Canada's strength is its cooperative multiculturalism....By condoning the assault of a foreign culture and the forced imposition of ethnocentric western views upon the world we are destroying the ties that hold our country together. Canada is built upon the concept of mutual coexistence between people with different perspectives. We therefore must play a role as a positive neutral country, not choosing a side but assisting all involved and hopefully enabling them to come to a peaceful compromise.
